La Paz to San Jose del Cabo, 100 Nautical Miles



THE BOAT – Seaward, an 82-foot staysail schooner

Seaward is an 82' classic staysail schooner constructed of steel and specifically designed for educational voyages. Inspected and licensed by the U.S. Coast Guard, her crew of four includes a Coast Guard certified captain along with a professional crew of experienced sailors and educators. Your Seaward Adventure will have up to 10 passengers. Seaward has two heads, one of which has a shower. Fresh water aboard is limited, however there is an unlimited supply of seawater for showering on deck.



WHAT TO BRING

Useful Tips

- Space aboard is limited please pack in crushable luggage (duffel bags, etc.) not a hard suitcase.
- Everything you bring needs to fit with you in your bunk.
- Clothes that can be worn over or under other layers will serve you well.
- Clothes that dry quickly are very important, and will make a world of difference once you are underway. Wool is a great option, as it maintains its warmth even when wet. As a rule, synthetic fibers like polar fleece and various polyesters and nylons dry more quickly than heavy cotton. Avoid denim, thick towels and heavy cotton sweatshirts it takes a long time for them to dry.
- Your clothing should be comfortable and easy to move in.
- Your clothing should also be durable. Items could get torn, stained, etc. Perhaps this is an opportunity to take some of your oldest T-shirts out for one last fling.
- Your bunk will be provided with a reading light, mattress, pillow, bed linens, light blanket, and towel. You do not need to bring these items.
- Laundry facilities are not available.
- When at sea, people typically change clothes much less frequently than on land, so pack accordingly.
- If you wear prescription glasses, bring a second pair. If you wear contact lenses, bring extras and your glasses as well.

Packing List

- Jackets/Foul Weather Gear: Foul weather gear (jacket and bibs) is the best, but a hooded windbreaker or polar fleece with a water proof shell will also work.
- Sunblock and Chapstick: SPF 15 or higher for both
- Sunglasses (with cord to prevent loss)
- Toiletries Kit (no hair dryers)
- Socks: Keep in mind that cotton will not dry quickly.
- Shoes: Two pairs. Be prepared to wear close-toed shoes with a captured heel on deck. Boat shoes, Keens, or sneakers are fine. You may bring any shoes you wish (including sandals and flip flops) for anchorages and shore excursions.
- Shorts: One to two pairs quick drying
- T-Shirts: Three to six

- Long Sleeved Shirts: Two to three it's often chilly
- Pants: One to two pairs. Light weight canvas or synthetic blends avoid denim as it never dries
- Warm Hat
- Sweater or Fleece: Wool or polar fleece avoid cotton.
- Sun Hat wide brim is best
- Bathing Suit

Recommended Items:

Writing and reading materials, camera, musical instruments, snorkeling gear, ziplock bags (nearly waterproof packaging), water bottle, baby wipes (a nice way to refresh between showers), a red flashlight. (Red flashlights are good for night vision, but you needn't buy an expensive headlamp. The low-budget version of a small flashlight painted with red nail polish works just fine!)

WEATHER

Water Temp in the Sea of Cortez in March is 68 degrees.

MEALS ON BOARD

All meals are included, and freshly prepared by a gourmet chef. While we cannot guarantee the menu, as ingredients are chosen based on availability, below is a sample menu.

DAY 1

BREAKFAST

Spinach, tomato and cheddar cheese quiche with homemade crust; fresh fruit; toast with jam; French press coffee; tea; Mexican hot chocolate; juice of the day

LUNCH

Arugula, spinach and romaine lettuces with couscous, dried cranberries, tomatoes and tuna, topped with a creamy homemade mustard lime dressing; side of sliced French bread

SNACKS & SUNDOWNERS

Traditional Mexican ceviche with conch, shrimp or fresh caught Mahi Mahi; fresh lime margaritas

DINNER

Chili rellenos baked with cheddar cheese, onion, garlic, tomatoes and tomato-based rice; tortilla chips and guacamole

DESSERT

Strawberries in fresh homemade whipped cream with popovers

<u>DAY 2</u>

BREAKFAST

Granola, yogurt, fresh fruit, honey; plantain muffins topped with oat and brown sugar crumble

topping; French press coffee; tea; Mexican hot chocolate; juice of the day (mango)

LUNCH

Mahi Mahi tacos with avocado, mushrooms, tomatoes and spinach on grilled flour tortillas with lime and sriracha

SNACKS & SUNDOWNERS

Brie with crackers; fresh apples and grapes; strawberry jam and red pepper jam; coco lemonade; coconut limeade with light rum

DINNER

Green couscous with pistachios, green onions, green chili peppers, parsley and mint, served over arugula salad

ITINERARY

March 7, Day 1: Costa Bahia Marina to Bahia Falsa

Approx. 10 Nautical Miles

- Passengers board Seaward at noon on Tuesday, March 7th at Costa Baja Marina in La Paz.
- Once passengers are on board and settled in, we will get off the dock.
- From La Paz we will head to Bahia Falsa to anchor, swim, relax, and sail our little boat Santo.
- We finish the evening with cocktail hour and a gourmet meal prepared by the ship's chef.
- We'll enjoy a beautiful sunset over the Sea of Cortez dreaming of the next day's adventure.



March 8, Day 2: Bahia Falsa to Espiritu Santo

Approx. 8 Nautical Miles

- We have arranged for passengers to have the opportunity to swim with Whale Sharks for \$85 USD. A local Panga (a 20ft open motor boat) will pick passengers up for a 3-hour excursion.
- Those who are not swimming with Whale Sharks are welcome to relax on board or head to the beach for the morning.



- Once divers and beach goers are back on board, we will sail for Espiritu Santo, one of the protected Islands off of La Paz.
- Here we will anchor and enjoy another wonderful evening on board Seaward.

March 9, Day 3: Espiritu Santo to Isla Islotes

Approx. 12 Nautical Miles

- We will spend the day exploring the uninhabited island of Espiritu Santo and make our way towards Isla Islotes.
- The islands feature pristine beaches, clear blue waters, and unmatched diving/ snorkeling opportunities.



March 10, Day 4: Isla Islotes

No Sailing Day

- Seaward will spend a second day at the islands, focusing on Isla Islotes.
- This little island is home to a large seal pup population.
- Activities for this day include swimming with these seal pups, hiking the islands, or beach going.

March 11, Day 5: Isla Islotes to Ensenada de los Muertos

Approx. 55 Nautical Miles

- After spending a few days anchored off the remote islands in the Sea of Cortez, we will begin to head south and make our longest passage yet!
- Our destination will be Ensenada de Los Muertos where passengers will have the opportunity to relax after a day of sailing in the Sea of Cortez.
- A great opportunity to relax and have a Margarita!
- Resort offers showers and amenities!







March 12, Day 6: Bahia los Muertos to Los Frailes

Approx. 45 Nautical Miles

• Swimming, beach going, and sailing our little boat Santo for the day!

March 13, Day 7: Los Frailes to Puerto Los Cabo Marina

Approx. 30 Nautical Miles

• Guests will disembark around noon. There is a shuttle from San Jose Del Cabo- La Paz.
