The Society Islands offer a wonderful blend of brisk open ocean sailing between islands and amazing sailing conditions within the confines of the coral reefs that surround these islands. *Upon the Trip Leader's judgement, the itineraries are subject to change based on sea state, weather conditions, anchorages.

The itinerary is designed around typical weather conditions in the Society Islands for September and October but may be adjusted based on local conditions and weather patterns. **The Trip Leader will make prudent decisions based on wind, weather, and sea state to ensure a safe and enjoyable trip.** The Society Islands' sailing conditions are classified as an intermediate (Level 2) Sailing Destination, that include some open water sailing and alert line-of-sight navigation when sailing near and within the vast reef complex that surrounds and protects these islands. In perspective, the British Virgin Islands and Croatia are Level 1 and Greece Level 2, where Level 2 being more challenging than Level 1 on this scale. With MSC's highly experienced captains (who are USCG Captains and ASA Instructors) providing the planning, navigation and coaching, the bareboat option in these incredible waters is obtainable and straightforward.

We will visit a host of islands, each with unique characteristics. The Society Islands flotilla is designed around the vacation cruising and charter lifestyle. The islands offer a variety of dining, snorkeling, diving, island touring, hiking, and shopping activities. The primary economy in these islands is tourism. The itinerary includes a combination of sailing with longer (up to 25 NM) open ocean passages with shorter (5-11 NM) stretches in calm and spectacular clear waters within the reef complex to sharpen your navigation skills.

This is a flotilla, and the goal is to have all boats follow a similar route and plan. Part of the adventure is connecting to other boats and members. We often have a rotating happy hour in the evenings. Each boat can take a turn hosting one night and we all dinghy over to enjoy snacks and drinks after anchoring up. There may be need and/or opportunities to anchor up in different locations or visit different sites based on conditions or interests. Options will be coordinated through the Trip Leader on a case-by-case basis.

Here is the day-by-day plan with a short description of the destination for each of the proposed stops and ideas on what is available to do while we're there. To aid you in your discovery of what further experiences are possible at each of the planned stops along this 11-day sailing and land adventure, convenient travel advisory links are provided.



DAY 1 - Monday, September 23: Arrive at Sunsail Base, Marina Apooiti, Raiatea [~3NM]

Check in at base before noon and meet up with your other crew mates. While the skippers attend chart briefings, crew members will split provisioning duties. Some will inventory and store the provisions, while others visit the local market in Uturoa town for items that were not pre-ordered. It's a good idea to check the fit of the snorkel gear provided by Sunsail before departure. Depart mid-afternoon for a short sail from Marina Apooiti, Raiatea to Apu Bay, Taha'a. Ashore you may swim, visit a black pearl farm, gorge on a Polynesian dinner, and be dazzled by a traditional fire dance.



DAY 2 - Tuesday September 24: Apu Bay, Taha'a to Bora Bora [~26NM]

Get underway and exit the lagoon through Passe Paipai for a beautiful sail across the open Pacific Ocean to mystical Bora Bora. This is usually a broad reach, making our first ocean passage especially pleasant. As we leave the islands of Taha'a and Raiatea in our wake, the iconic Mount Otemanu looms ever larger, enticing us with the magic of Bali Hai from the movie *South Pacific*. Be on the lookout for humpback whales and dolphins. In Vaitape, we'll find delicious fresh fish for dining onboard later in the trip. For this night's dinner we can choose between Bora Bora's best restaurants — Bora Bora Yacht Club, MaiKai Yacht Club or St. James. Read more about what awaits you in Bora Bora.



DAY 3 - Wednesday, September 25: Motu Piti Aau & Taurere, Bora Bora [~9NM]

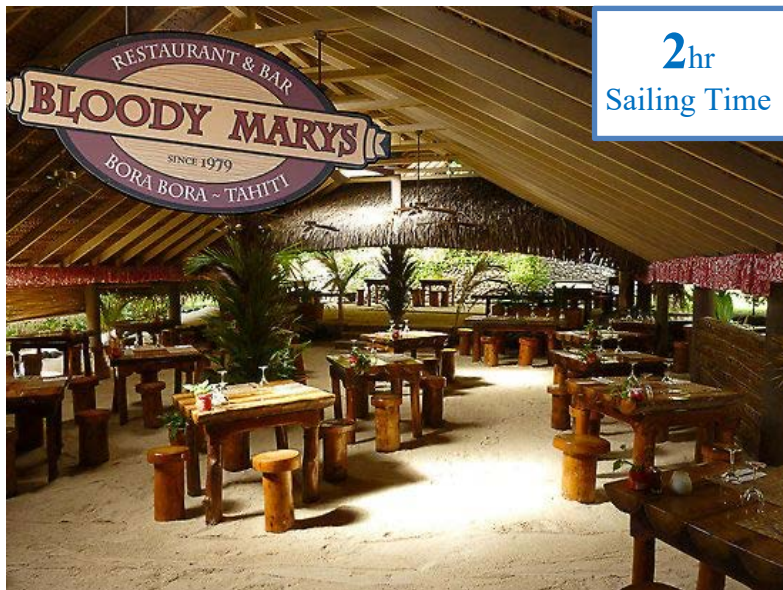
Make way around the north and east sides of Bora Bora through the turquoise lagoon surrounded by coral gardens and sandy shallows. Keep an eye out for coral heads and the cardinal marker navigation aids for those who want to practice their piloting skills in shallow water. The cruise is a photographer's delight. Anchor or moor near the Lagoonarium and snorkel with the tame reef sharks, rays, and tropical

fish in a protected environment. Continue south, skirting the high-end resorts with their overwater bungalows and follow manta rays as they gracefully glide through the water, skimming just above the bottom.

Anchor or moor in the shallows off Motu Piti Aau, enjoy a swim, a stroll on the beach, or snorkel to see colorful fish and giant clams embedded in the coral. Have a relaxing evening and meal aboard. The views of Bora Bora's mountainous landscape change with every passing minute — it's one of the most beautiful places on Earth!

DAY 4 - Thursday, September 26: Baie de Povai, Bora Bora [~11NM]



2hr
Sailing Time

After a morning swim, travel back to the southwest side of Bora Bora to the famous Bloody Mary's Restaurant, named after the character from the movie *South Pacific*.

Tour the town shops, the beautiful churches, and rent an electric car or motor scooter to cruise around the island. There's only one road so you cannot get lost.

Dinghy ashore, don snorkel gear, and drift along the tidal river, exploring the coral garden as the incoming tide carries you blissfully along.

DAY 5 - Friday, September 27: Bora Bora to Tapuamu Bay, Taha'a [~25nm]



4.5hr
Sailing Time

Sail to Taha'a and anchor off the reef at Motu Tautau. Enjoy lunch and spend the afternoon snorkeling in the shallows.

Look for multicolored fish as they dart to and fro in the coral garden.

Explore this tiny sandy island and the single beautiful resort of the same name. Moor for the night or pick a mooring ball in Tapuamu Bay, then tour a Tahitian rum distillery ashore.

DAY 6 - Saturday, September 28: Taha'a to Fa'aroa Bay, Raiatea [~19NM]



4hr
Sailing Time

In the morning we will sail within the protective fringing reef that surrounds both Taha'a and Raiatea. Raiatea is relatively large, with craggy steep mountains making for a picturesque tour down its east side. We have many choices of destinations there. We can take the dinghy up Tahiti's only navigable river or have *Poisson Cru* at a serene *Pension Atiapiti* (Tahitian for bed and breakfast inn), tour the holy *mare of Taputapuatea*, the ancient center of all Polynesian culture, or cruise to the far south end of Raiatea to anchor off Motu Naonao for more snorkeling.

DAY 7 - Sunday, September 29: Raiatea to Fare, Huahine [~21nm]

Exit one of Raiatea's many passes and set sail for Huahine. This leg of the trip is usually a close reach, testing your sail trim skills to make the most of the easterly breeze. Our destination is Fare, the small village capital center. Huahine is often overshadowed by its more famous sister islands but is becoming a favorite of many cruisers due to its

friendly local vibe, unspoiled lands, and variety of bays and touring opportunities. We can have dinner along the bay at the laid-back Huahine Yacht Club with our feet in the sand.

DAY 8 - Monday, September 30: Fare to Haapu Bay (snorkel) then Baie d'Avea [~7nm]



In the morning go for a swim, tour the village of Fare, and enjoy the wonders of an eclectic market to stock up on fresh baguettes and other local delights. Then head south along Huahine's picturesque west coast and pick up a mooring just south of Bourayne Bay for one of the island's top snorkel destinations. An outrigger canoe might hitchhike a ride, surfing down your boat's bow wave. End this relaxed cruise within the lagoon at serene Baie d'Avea, where the water is crystal clear. Snorkeling off nearby Pointe Tiva is amazing. The two restaurants on the beach are very different from one another, but both serve excellent Polynesian food and drinks.

DAY 9 - Tuesday, October 1: Baie d’Avea, Huahine - Layover Day



Spend the day relaxing in this beautiful bay, take an island tour, visit a black pearl farm, vanilla plantation, an ancient archaeological *mare*, and feed freshwater blue-eyed eels, which are thought to possess magical powers. You may also choose to rent a car, scooter, or bike and explore at your own pace.

Just off the point of the beach there is some very good snorkeling to be found.

DAY 10 - Wednesday, October 2: Huahine to Ha’amene Bay, Taha’a [~30nm]

Leave Huahine in the morning, sail along the island’s west coast, then exit Passe Avepehi and head west across the Pacific Ocean for about 20 nautical miles. Enter Taha’a through Passe Taohotu. Enjoy a snorkel and lunch at Mehaea, stroll on the

beach, then make the short hop across the lagoon into Haamene Bay. Swim and snorkel along the reef, take the optional trip to Hibiscus Sea Turtle Protection sanctuary, or make a final visit to the Haamene Bay Pearl Farm. Relax and enjoy the protected, fjord-like bay. Experience the dining attraction of Polynesian food at Hibiscus or Taha’a MaiTai as you settle in for your final night in this divine tropical paradise.

- 4 stateroom cabins, hanging locker, air conditioning and fan in each cabin.
- Galley is located forward, and the dining area is located aft with large forward-facing windows and sliding doors between the saloon and aft cockpit - opening access and promoting ventilation throughout the catamaran.

The Boat and Accommodations

The Moorings 4000 features a spacious 3 cabin layout. An owner's suite fills the entire starboard hull with ample storage, counter space, a double bed, and a full private bathroom. Two additional cabins, each with double beds, share a full bathroom in the port hull.

- The fully appointed galley is located forward to a spacious settee located aft. Oversized sliding glass doors open to the aft cockpit providing panoramic views from the interior and the best of indoor/outdoor living. Two aft cabins with double berth and en-suite head / shower with access from cabin and saloon.
- A convenient front door that opens to the trampoline, perfect for easy access to sunbathing and relaxing with friends and family.
- This yacht has generator-powered A/C.
- Raised helm station with a full range of Raymarine electronics.



TRAVEL ARRANGEMENTS

You are responsible for booking your own airfare. Airfare pricing is presently running \$2,000 per person. If you would like to use a travel agent to book your flights, we suggest Bob Entwisle at E&E Travel, (415) 819-5665, or email bobetravels@gmail.com. If you plan on arriving early or spending a few extras at the conclusion of the voyage, there are a variety lodging options available on Raiatea and the other nearby islands that are reachable by ferry or air.

WHAT TO BRING

Passport

We will be traveling to French Polynesia. There is no visa required for US citizens but check with your state department if you are traveling from a different country. Please ensure your passport is current and will not expire for at least six months after the conclusion of trip.

Luggage

We suggest traveling light. Your gear should fit in a medium duffel bag and a small carry-on bag. Your carry-on should be less than 15 pounds. We recommend using a dry bag or backpack. Both bags should be collapsible for easy storage on the boat in small space. Do not bring bags with hard frames as they are difficult to stow.

Gear

We have found that people often only use about half of what they bring. A great way to bring only what you use is to lay all your items out and reduce it by 50%. Lay them out again and then reduce again. Gear weight depends on weather conditions of course, but lightweight layering pieces made of moisture-wicking fabric that will dry quickly is essential. Your total gear weight should be less than 55lbs, including carry-on.

Sun conditions can be very different than in San Francisco Bay. Consider lightweight clothing that covers exposed areas without adding bulk or weight. There are a variety of lightweight pants, shirts, and blouses that provide UV protection. Sunscreen and hats are essential.

What Not to Bring

Different states and countries have different travel rules, regulations, and considerations. If you have specific questions about an item, ask us. Some general items you should *not* bring are illegal drugs, weapons, hair dryers, expensive jewelry, pets, rigid suitcases, surfboards, golf clubs (it has happened), fireworks, and dive tanks. Linens, towels, and pillows are provided on each boat and are not necessary to bring.

Considerations

The charter base will have a variety of snorkel gear and equipment to choose from. These items are included in the cost of the trip. Again, you are more than welcome to bring your own. Keep in mind that these items tend to be bulkier and heavier. A reasonable compromise may be to bring your own mask and snorkel and use the fins provided on board.

There are PFDs (lifejackets) are provided onboard the boat, however, you are more than welcome to bring your own. Note that inflatable PFDs can be problematic at TSA checkpoints.

WEATHER

The weather in French Polynesia is beautiful and mild year-round. The month of September is characterized by an average temperature of 78°F or above. Daily low temperatures range from 70°F to 75°F, although there can be a chill in the air when it rains.

The most common forms of precipitation are brief squalls or thunderstorms. Rain averages approximately 2 inches in September.

Relative humidity typically ranges from 52% (mildly humid) to 87% (very humid) over the course of the season, rarely dropping below 38%.

WIND CONDITIONS, CURRENTS and TIDES

In September, wind typically blows out of the southeast at 15-20 knots and occasionally builds to 25 knots. When the swell comes from the southwest, a cross-swell occurs, and seas can build three to five feet in squalls and in higher winds. Tides tend to be diurnal and have a range of approximately 12 inches from low (~0600/1800) to high tide (~0000/1200).

GALLEY AND PROVISIONING

Provisioning will be discussed at the crew meeting. Initial menus will be made for staples. Provisioning for breakfast, lunch, and snacks will be done in advance through the charter company and are included in the cost of the trip for the skippered boats. We will assist bareboat skippers in planning for their charters. Additional provisioning will depend on crews' desires. Final provisioning will be completed once we arrive at the base in Uturoa, Raiatea.

For provisioning needs, there is an excellent central market in downtown Uturoa that is about 1.2mi from the base. Each skipper will work with participants to select items to appeal individual tastes on board. It is a charming experience to wander through the local grocery store and see what fresh specialty items are available. Recognize that all retail goods must be shipped to the islands, so costs can be higher than you might expect.



Each boat is fully equipped with:

- Three-burner gas stove and oven with outdoor charcoal grill
- Refrigerator with separate freezer drawer
- Comfortable salon seating area
- Storage cabinets for provisions
- Cooking pots and pans

The crew will decide on how many meals they plan on eating ashore and provision accordingly. Food and beverage costs vary based on individual crews' desires. Breakfast, lunch, snacks, and one dinner will be provisioned through Sunsail on club boats. Additional meals will be decided upon and purchased as a collective by the crew, depending on tastes.

Global Destinations recognizes that people have different experiences and tastes in alcoholic beverages and provisioning time will be provided for members to make their own purchases. One or two crew members are assigned to stowing the provisions.

While galley duty is a shared responsibility, those who inventory the provisions can help others to find stored items. Each boat will set up their own cooking and cleaning schedules based on crew expectations and experience.

Special Dietary Needs

The Trip Leader and Skippers will consult with participants at crew meeting regarding advanced provisioning. This is your opportunity to let them know if you have specific dietary needs or restrictions. We can plan to accommodate you. If there are unique items you desire, you will have time to purchase them during the provisioning trip.

Breakfast

Breakfast will typically be between 7:00 AM to 9:00 AM each day on club boats, with flexibility based on the itinerary, group, and individual desires. We have enjoyed full course breakfasts, complete with bacon, eggs, et cetera. We have also enjoyed granola bars and fruit, depending on the crew.

The goal is to meet your needs so you will have energy to enjoy the rest of your day.

Lunches

Lunches are very casual with no set schedule and can soup and sandwiches, salads, veggie sticks, or local fare. Lunch is often served under way and conditions may dictate what we have on a particular day. If the crew agrees, and a nice lunch spot is found, we can dinghy ashore to eat at a local restaurant or picnic on the beach.

Snacks

Snacks are always a very personal thing and whatever the crew desires. Sometimes they can be chips and salsa or cheese and crackers. Fresh fruit and nuts are always good (and delicious), as they require little to no preparation and help maintain energy.

Dinners

Dinners provide the most flexibility. We can choose to relax on board, cook and watch the sunset, or go ashore and sample the local culture and cuisine. When we make provisioning plans, at least one dinner meal on board needs to be included so that if we find a secluded anchorage and decide not to move, we can remain to enjoy the peace and serenity. The local watering holes and restaurants lend to much of the Society Islands charm. If available, eating fresh fish on the beach is a must-do activity.

Dinner Ashore

If we choose to go ashore in the evening, meal costs will be the responsibility of each person. Usually, most establishments will be willing to split checks. Be sure to carry some cash with you as small “mom and pop” places only accept cash.

Perishables

Over the years, we have discovered that certain items have a very short shelf life in the marine environment. We will try to anticipate this by acquiring the fewest possible perishables and restock en route. Often, we come across fresh fish on the docks or at open markets. There is nothing as delicious as fresh seafood caught that very day.
